Castling keeps your king safe. You should castle as early in the game as you reasonably can. You may castle when all of the following apply:

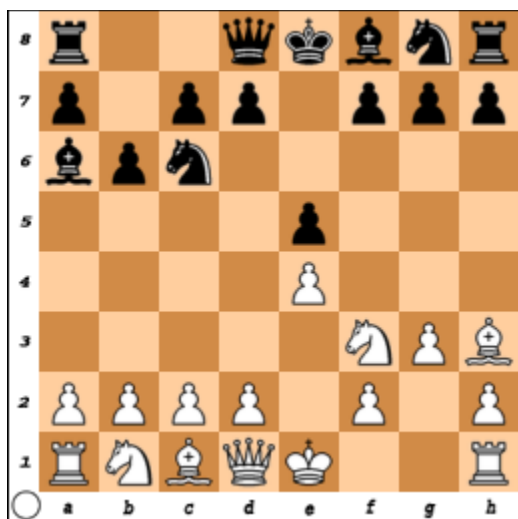
- The king has not moved before in the game.
- The rook has not moved before in the game.
- There are no pieces between the king and a rook.
- The king is not in check.
- The king does not move through check.
- The king does not move into check.

To perform the castling move, do this:

- Use *one* hand to move *one piece at a time*.
- First, move the king two squares toward the rook.
- Second, move the rook just over the king.
- It should look like one of these when done:



For each board, check that answer that is true for white:



- No castling, the king is in check.

- No castling, the king has moved already.
